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An exceptional and unique French 19th century Louis XVI st. mahogany, burl elmwood, and ormolu side table, after a model by Adam Weisweiler. The circular table is raised by elegant circular tapered legs with fine topie shaped feet and ormolu top caps. Each leg is connected by a stunning and most decorative pierced geometric shaped mahogany stretcher with ormolu fillets at the border and a central circular mottled reserve. Four beautiful and unique double bamboo designed supports lead upwards to richly chased lion head mounts with rings in their mouths. The circular burl elmwood top displays an exceptional butterfly veneered design and a central circular reserve fitted within a mottled wrap around ormolu gallery with a hammered background.

Adam Weisweiler (1750-1810) was a renowned

French master cabinetmaker in the Louis XVI period. Weisweiler supplied the
writing table of steel, lacquer and ebony and gilt-bronze for Marie
Antoinette at the Château de Saint-Cloud in 1784. Also furniture for
the Prince Regent (later George IV) at Carlton House, London. Weisweiler
specialized in small refined pieces, with fine lines, delicate legs with light
interlaced stretchers, gilt-bronze plaques, mounts, Sèvres porcelain plaques,
and panels of pietra dura. Weisweiler was commissioned by Queen
Hortense and collaborated with Pierre-Philippe Thomire.
